opening in late Spring 2024. The children will get all the pieces of equipment they chose during the consultation, plus some additional items!

Many of you will have seen that a sign has gone up at the site of the school on Brize Meadow. Unfortunately, this does not mean that the school is about to be built. Having checked with Bloor Homes, they have advised me that it is their understanding that Oxfordshire County Council is aiming to deliver the proposed new primary school after 2025.

The process of awarding the contract to build the Elder Bank Hall extension has been long and extensive due to Covid, changes within the Council and change of Architect, due to unforeseen circumstances. However, by the time you read this we hope to have a builder in place which

> means that work on building the shell will start in early 2024.

We have also continued to work with the MOD and RAFBN regarding



the radar tower, and we are very close to securing funds to provide landscaping around the northwest corner of the Tactical Medical Wing to help screen the harsh impact of the base of the radar tower.

Also, we have still not given up on getting bus shelters on Monahan Way but the news that OCC is under huge financial pressures in setting their 2024/25 budget is not looking good, but we will continue to have dialogue with the Cabinet member for Highway Management (currently Andrew Gant).

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank those residents who responded to the recent Neighbourhood Plan Regulation 14 consultation. The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, on behalf of the Parish Council, is collating the responses and will be preparing a Consultation Statement for submission to the Planning Inspectorate.

Although the nights are drawing in and the temperature is somewhere near to normal for Autumn, we should still try and spend some time outdoors. Go for a walk and take the time to notice the changing of the season (albeit later this year), collect conkers, play conkers (but responsibly), kick through the leaves (once they've started

dropping!) and do go along to and all of the wonderful events going on in November and December! These include the Community Carol Service, Brize Norton School Association Quiz Night and of course the Christmas Market! Indulge yourself with a mug of hot chocolate or one of the many flavours of spicy drinks now available – go on...

You're worth it!

"So, after deciding to buy a little tractor as a Parish Council in 1988 for a mere £25, we were all going to get mowing... but as volunteering dwindled a little, it was just me. But do you know what? I quite enjoyed it actually!"

ane met Fred on the Recreational ground, for one of the last times he would head out on the tractor to mow the grass for the village.

It really was a sad occasion; we have all been spoilt by his dedication, determination and his attention to detail in making sure the ground was always in tip-top condition for everyone to use and enjoy.

You have to say that our beautiful rec, come cricket pitch, football ground, rounders circle, treasure

trail, bug hunt, fitness class location, conker competition, kite flying and village event site is a pretty lovely place to be, and most of this is because of the green-fingered, attention to detail that Fred has given it over the years.

Born in Brize Norton at Moat Farm (now Church Farm), Fred enjoyed his time playing cricket and football as a lad on a Saturday afternoon. Especially when the football club re-formed in 1963. It was quite a social affair and wanting to make sure the conditions were at their best, as well as rivalled by other teams around, the S&SC and Parish Council decided that the field needed to be mowed a little more frequently, and took on the grounds maintenance themselves.

After spending over 50 years on the Council then the Sports & Social Club as well as being a Village Blacksmith for quite sometime, it was time to blow the final whistle and enjoy a little



more relaxed time with his beautiful wife, Kath.

Fred had seen many changes in Brize; he'd helped build and shape many of the buildings in the village using his skills as a Blacksmith, he'd watched village life from the seat of his mower and even from up a tree sometimes, when he helped fetch a ball that'd been kicked up there!

Over the years, he'd waved to many pre-school children over the fence (more recently including his own little Great Grand-daughter Gracie), while he patiently explained why he was mowing the grass that week; he'd had many conversations about the weather, the changing of the seasons, the local football and cricket results as well as finding out who was going to be 'up the club' at the weekend.

Fred loved making the ground nice for people to play on, kids to run on and it was even therapeutic for him as he whiled away the time with a little singing or watching the birds fly over. He even remarked that his family had often described him as 'the man who cuts the grass'!

Now Fred has retired he's planning on spending a couple more hours on the allotment, do a few more puzzles and crosswords, and possibly spend a little more time with Kath...



After spending 60 years married to Kath, Jane asked what was the secret to a long and happy marriage?

"Respect" said Fred with a little hesitation but a lot of fondness; he explained that it was the respect of one another and the love of respecting what each other loves to do that kept them both happy.

Jane spent a lovely couple of afternoons chatting with Fred and as they were finishing up their conversation, Jane said; "I think I speak for everyone when I say 'Thank You! Thank you for being there and for spending your time helping the village and for keeping this wonderful space the best it could possibly be."

Re-instating Our Village Pond

rize Norton Parish Council is working closely with the West Oxfordshire District Council Flood Prevention Officer to provide mitigation measures to help reduce surface water flooding in the south of the village.

The first of these is to construct an attenuation pond on the north side of Monahan Way which is designed to hold back the surface water flowing down from the A40 and the fields in between. This attenuation pond will allow the surface water to flow southwards at a reduced rate towards the village pond, which is on the south side of Burford

> Road, opposite the Masons Arms.

The second measure is to increase the size of the village pond and turn it into a second attenuation pond. Although the pond was cleared out approximately ten years ago, once again, it is currently overgrown in vegetation and young saplings all of which will need to be removed.

However, this is one of the very few areas in the village of standing water and as such will be a huge boon to wildlife in the area.

We foresee an area with a graded base to the pond and some overhanging trees which will provide potential for wildlife and opportunities for public enjoyment of the site whilst



providing a resource that can be used by schools and other groups for educational purposes.

We also hope that a conservation group can eventually be created with villagers contributing to the maintenance of this and other natural sites within the village.

We hope you agree with this plan of action and should you have any questions or suggestions please do not hesitate to contact the Parish Council.

The Committee are at the planning stage with Bloor Homes to develop a large semicircular seating area in the Southern part of the Mary Ellis County Park. Bloor Homes are landscaping this whole area as part of the next phase of development; therefore, this is a priority.


The second focus will be to commemorate Mary Ellis and ideas are developing based on a spitfire, utilising the wing shape for both seating, and play, whilst providing information about Mary Ellis's flying, rallying, and farming life. Public Art shared the gazebo at the Village Bash with 'Wild Oxfordshire', an organisation with an emphasis on 'working together for nature'. They were very encouraged by the enthusiasm shown in support of nature and increasing biodiversity. Responses have been collated from the consultations and these demonstrate that villagers do indeed want the village to focus on nature.

In has been very encouraging that many villagers are keen to develop Public Art initiatives that support nature. This will be our next priority!

he Autumn Term has arrived and with that, as a school. we have welcomed new children and families to the Brize Norton School community along with new members to our team. The start of the new school year has seen as our review our school vision. Our vision for all within the school community is to SHINE for ourselves and each other with kindness. Last year, pupil voice highlighted the importance of kindness being an underpinning value for our children. With the launch of our renewed Vision Statement, we have initiated the 'Cup of Kindness' to our weekly celebrations. Each week, the staff team nominate a child who has shown kindness to themselves or one another who are then presented with a trophy within our celebration assembly. This has begun successfully with children receiving recognition for something that is so valued among us as a community.

As a school, relationships and connectedness underpins all that we do. We are one of

the lucky Oxfordshire schools who are taking part in the Oxfordshire County Council pilot scheme of the Relational and Restorative programme. This programme looks to see us develop our relational practice as a community, ensuring all children feel valued, heard and safe and enables them to flourish as individuals. Myself, the headteacher, and Mrs Maria Penn, the SENCO, are attending the leadership programme and will be begin embedding this within the culture of our school over the coming academic year and beyond. I am very much looking forward to launching this more fully to our parents in the coming terms.

This year has also seen us develop and grow our leadership roles for children. We have a new school council committee who will be supporting me with initiatives within the school which encompasses the pupil voice. We have also a new Eco Committee who will be led by Mrs Weeks. You may well see this committee out and about within the village during lunchtimes as they would like

Murmurations

Have you ever seen a murmuration? I guess some of you will be saying "What's a murmuration"?

Well, a murmuration is when winter starlings, in very large numbers gather together, before settling in a communal roost.

Before they settle down, they often fly in a huge flock which swoops and swirls in a coordinated manner-like an enormous Mexican wave.

In the UK, this is one of our greatest natural sights and viewers are often left spellbound after watching it.

These roosting sites are scattered all over the country with the biggest ones occurring on the old Brighton pier and at Ham Wall RSPB reserve in Somerset.

Smaller ones occur locally and in recent years these have been at Otmoor RSPB reserve near Oxford, Standlake common, Dix pit near Stanton Harcourt and another site near Eynsham.

It is pretty certain that the birds

we see gathering on the wires crossing Station Lane, near the allotment in the centre of Brize Norton, will go to one of these sites. Each evening I watch them leave the wires before dusk and swirl around the village collecting more birds as they go before heading off to the East.

In the winter months our local birds are joined by an almost equal number of migrant starlings from Eastern Europe. The number of these migrants depending on how hard the eastern European winter is.

Why starlings murmurate is a question that ornithologists have long debated but it is accepted that there is greater protection in numbers and raptors such as peregrines find it difficult to target individual birds in such a swarming mass.

Also, the close proximity of the birds on branches or in reedbeds helps them stay warm. Intriguingly research shows that the birds appear to be able to share information on the best sites to feed from, through means unknown.

When I was a teenager, I visited a starling roost at Maggot's Grove near Crawley. Maggots' grove is

named after the old name for a magpie a 'maggot pie' rather than as I had surmised 'Farmer Maggot' in JRR Tolkien's novels.

Anyway, back to that evening, as the fourteen-year-old me slipped into the spinney on that moonlit night the trees stood out as silvery-white because of their coating of bird droppings.

With but a few paces in and I soon realised that I was surrounded by many thousands of birds on every branch from chest level upwards.

It was pretty spooky but with an irresistible fascination I pressed on trying to put thoughts of Tippi Hedren in Hitchcock's 'The Birds' out of my head. I saw ahead of me a silvery pool of light and as I stepped into the clearing, I saw I was not alone.

A large dog fox had also stopped and was staring intently at me his fur silvery grey in the moonlight.

I froze and he slowly walked past me close enough for me to have touched him.

A magical moment that will be forever imprinted on my mind.



When the weather turns cold and wet, our crocodile microclimate remains nice and warm. because that's how they like it and their happiness is what matters most to us. When we were recently creating the official 2024 Zoo Calendar, it was only after we selected the photos that we realised half of the species featured are either critically endangered or vulnerable. This is the sad reality of the world we live in, and we are proud to be able to contribute



towards protecting the future of these species, this includes our stunning Siamese crocodile, Hugo, who also has the honour of being on the front cover for 2024. In fact, talking of Hugo, you'll now find Siamese crocodiles Hugo and Rebecca, who were the first breeding pair in the UK, in the different enclosure at the back of the main Croc building, including a glass walkway for those brave enough to step onto the glass to potentially see a crocodile below. Moving crocodiles gives us the opportunity to get up close and have a really good health check of the animals. We also collect valuable data such as weights and various measurements, allowing us to monitor the development of the crocs. Rebecca measures a respectable



include exercise groups (Madie's Mental Health Walks, Carterton Walkie Talkie, Active Oxfordshire


'Move Together'), or start your own friendship group with like-minded people and see if you can club together at Christmas.

- 🔅 If you haven't already done so, collect any seed heads such as annual sweet peas and poppies. Dry them off indoors and store them in a labelled paper envelope. We store my envelopes in port box! 2
- Now is the time to plant tulips and daffodil bulbs along with pansies, primroses

and heathers, which are full of colour and available at garden centres and most supermarkets. You can plant these in your pots, containers and baskets, and use ivy to soften the edges and add interest³.

- * Each year we add more evergreens to our pots which look beautiful such as qaultheria procumbens (partridge berry), skimmia japonica or heuchera.
- # If planting cyclamen, position them in pots which are sheltered or under shrubs or bushes. This protects them from the snow4.
- If your roses had black-spot and/or rust, then be sure to pick up the fallen leaves as well as pruning the rose bush back. Collecting the leaves will prevent speak of rose diseases.
- While cutting back climbers, check your trellises are not broken, and make sure climbers remain well tied up.
- * Last winter we lost so many plants which had survived in the garden for many years

before. This year we have decided to mulch many of our plants including salvias, fuchsias and dhalias (if you leave them in the ground). Use plenty of bark or mulch to cover the earth beneath your plants. This will act like a blanket from the frost⁵.

- If you are planning a bonfire in your garden, check for hedgehogs before you light it, and if tidying leaves, be sure to leave some near hedges for hedgehogs to use for nesting.
- 🌸 Clean your bird feeders and nesting boxes due to all the usage they've had since spring.

DECEMBER

- * The weather is now cold, wet and windy, so make sure your plants are supported. Position pots in a place they are less likely to fall over in the winds.
- Cover outdoor taps and pipes to stop them freezing. We put a little jacket over our outside taps secured with velcro for easy removal if you need to use the tap.







If you have a greenhouse heater, check they are working before the frost sets in.

prevent them rotting.

- 🌞 Check tubers and corms (if you have lifted and stored them in the shed) to make sure they have dried and not rotting. We wrap ours loosely in newspaper for protection.
- Remember to keep feeding the birds: it's cold outside. Keep them well fed with fat balls, nuts and meal worms.
- # If you store bird food in the shed, be sure your feed is in a metal tub or something similar to prevent mice from chewing through and feasting on your bird food. Our resident house mouse (Mr Bojangles!) eats the fallen seed from the bird feeder.

JANUARY

* After spending lots of time indoors with family and friends during the holidays, pop outside to have a tidy-up

in readiness for the spring. I'm sure there are lots of bulbs starting to sprout and lots of colour from all the annuals planted.

- Maybe clean your plastic pots and keep your greenhouse clean. Use an oily rag to clean your garden tools as this will leave a thin layer of oil to prevent rusting.
- Check any covers on your plants are still wrapped well and check all supports too.
- You can still prune rosebushes in January while they are dormant. They can be treated with a spray for bugs and diseases.
- # If you have dark, old leaves on hellebores, cut them off so you see the greener leaves and the blooms6.
- # If your pansies are looking long and scraggy, cut the long bits off and keep deadheading to encourage more flowers.
- # If we have snow, use a brush or gently shake the snow off trees as the weight of the snow can snap branches. Also, if you did plant

cvclamen be sure to brush the snow off these too, as we find they die easily if the snow is left on them.

Continue to feed our feathery friends and make sure they have access to fresh water. We usually pour a jug of warm water on our bird baths to break the ice if we've had a hard frost.

Issue burglary prevention tips in the run up to Christmas

As nights draw in and Christmas gets closer, it is important for everyone to protect their house so they're not an attractive target for burglars.

A Thames Valley Police statement said: "We know that the period following the clocks going back and in the run up to Christmas often sees the number of burglaries start to rise.

"I will of course be out on patrol, targeting offenders and locations across the neighbourhood.

"You can reduce the risk of becoming a victim of burglary by taking a few simple steps."

If you're getting items delivered please make sure you:

- Track your parcels and make sure items are delivered when you are at home to receive them, or have them delivered to a trusted alternative address.
- Cut up packaging for any expensive items so that it will fit inside your refuse bin, never leave boxes next to the bin where they can be seen.
- Install a video doorbell; this can be connected to your mobile so you are notified immediately of any delivery, and is easier to install than a full CCTV system
- Install a security light
- Remove any address labels as they can give away what you've had delivered as well as increase the chances of you becoming a victim of identity fraud.
- As many people are likely to be celebrating at home this Christmas see the following prevention tips:
- Don't leave presents on view under the Christmas tree.
- Refrain from posting photos of high value presents, such

- as jewellery or electronics, on social media.
- Remember to mark your new presents using a UV pen and register them on the national property register at immobilise.com.





