Welcome to the Summer edition of Brize Norton Breeze.

irstly I would like to thank readers for their patience waiting for this edition whilst our lovely Editor Jayne had to take some time out due to illness. I'm very pleased to say that she is feeling much better now and back at the helm with this edition.

Much has happened since the last edition; The Brize Meadow Play Park opened on Saturday, 27 July and I'd like to say thank you to HAGS and Tom Hickman Landscaping for

making such a fantastic job of it. Poor Tom Hickman and his team were up against it the week after laying

the turf when the weather finally turned, and we had a mini heatwave! Tom pulled all out all the stops and had to have a sprinkler going 24/7 and arranged for a bowser of water to be delivered to basically flood the area to stop the turf from curling and drying out and was coming out early in the morning and late at night to move the sprinkler around. He really went above and beyond to make sure the turf survived and has given us such a beautiful landscaped area in which our children can now play. Thank you Tom.

The Elder Bank Hall extension is also well underway. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the pre-school especially for their patience whilst the work is being carried out and to the parents dropping off and collecting their children from school and to all

the visitors to the Pavilion and recreation ground.

The new footpath along Minster Lovell Road has also been completed by OCC and the existing path has been cleared and the overhanging branches and hedge cut back so I hope villagers are finding their walk along to the bus stops on Monahan Way or on to Ting Tang Lane safer. We are still waiting to hear when the bus shelters will be installed but apparently they are imminent. The footpath along Manor Road has also been widened and OCC is due back to flatten out the surface to make it safer as well. The footpath along Burford Road is on the list to be cleared so we hope that this too will be dealt with soon.

The Tennis Court net has now been put up, so the court is now available for a 'real' game of tennis. May I respectfully ask that whilst the net is in place, all other ball games are kept out of the court at this time along with bikes and scooters, to avoid any damage to the net. Plus a reminder that dogs are not allowed on the recreation ground at any time. They are allowed on the patio area around the pavilion but not beyond.



Since the last magazine, the Parish Council has begun a regular litter pick that takes place on the first Sunday of the month at 10am. We have two meeting points, one at the Humble Bumble Café and one at Brize Meadow where we hand out litter pickers and bags. We welcome volunteers to come along and join us for a couple of hours, or whatever time you can spare. Even if you just do your road, every little bit and every volunteer counts. Whenever you can, even if you can't make every month, we would be pleased to

see you. There are posters up around the village and reminders are posted on the various village Facebook groups.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Air Tanker for funding a native hedge along the north side of the Tactical Medical Wing to help shield the bottom of the radar tower equipment.

The Parish Council does have a vacancy for a new councillor to be co-opted onto the Council. If you have an interest in your local community and you have a few hours a month free, then

please do consider the role. More details can be found further on.

This is my last Chairman's Report as I have handed over the role to Cllr Les Goble. I'm still a Councillor and will be taking on other roles and responsibilities within the Council.

Wendy Way has spent over 5 years in her voluntary position of Chairman of Brize Norton Parish Council, and although Wendy is remaining on the Council, we could not let her leave her position without the unbelievable recognition she deserves.

Wendy has been amazing in, not only helping us all in the village come through a global pandemic, but for creating our 'Community Centre' when we came out of the pandemic, which is where the Elder Bank Hall, Recreational Ground, Pavilion and Humble Bumble Cafe live. During her Chairmanship, she has led us in welcoming refugees from Ukraine into the village, helping to organise many of our village celebrations alongside more solemn duties such as helping us to mourn HM Queen Elizabeth II by providing condolence books around the village and then, in-turn, helping to ensure funds from sponsors when we later celebrated the Coronation of HM King Charles III.

Wendy has been continually liaising with Bloor Homes, WODC and OCC to ensure Brize Norton benefitted from all of the Section 106 monies available and that these are used to build the Brize Meadow Play Park, Mary Ellis Country Park, the Public Art installation, add an extension to the Elder Bank Hall. It will also be used to fund the design and build of a replacement pavilion building on the recreation ground in the near future.

Wendy also opened Brize Meadow Lodge Care Home in 2023 and co-ordinated the Gentian grant fund to the village where several charities benefitted from a £2000 grant. Wendy also continues to liaise with developers, retailers, commercial and non-commercial fund providers to make sure that all of Brize Norton's residents and families all benefit from ongoing installations which are hoping to include a new multiuse games area where the tennis court on the recreation ground currently is and also a potential redevelopment of the playground behind the Primary School.

Wendy continues her work as a volunteer on many of the village community groups and as founder of the Brize Breeze, we hope to hear from her in the future!


What a year it has been! It is lovely to end with so many things to celebrate, one of which being our Ofsted report.

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

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

Over this long-wet winter, we have finalised a couple of art projects, while also discussing other ideas which may aspire and benefit all of us who live in the village.

he first project is the Spitfire sculptors' which will be situated in the northern part of the Mary Ellis Country Park.

For those who don't know, Mary Ellis became famous for flying Spitfires (along with many other aeroplanes) during the 2nd World war and became known as the Spitfire Lady!


She lived in the Manor House during her early years, and her

father farm the land which now accommodates Brize Meadow.

Therefore, the spitfire theme seem a very appropriate way of commemorating this village hero.

It is hoped that the finished project, which will be three or four sculptors depicting the wonderful spitfire as it 'takes off' out of the wild flower meadow in the Mary Ellis Country Park..

The second project is an



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amphitheatre. again situated in the Mary Ellis Country Park. This 40/50 seat, two-tiered amphitheatre, with a stage/ platform, and hopefully an artistic mosaic interpretation running around inside the seating area, explaining the history of our village.

The construction, which has yet to be decided, but where possible will be built using local natural material, for

example Cotswold stone.

It is hoped, that once completed it can be used by village clubs. organisations and of course the school to hold readings, or storytelling, or craft/art demonstrations, mid-night concerts! (If allowed).

Or it could be just a place to sit and talk with family and friends.

It is now time to obtain costs and engage the professionals in to see the most efficient way of constructing these projects.

The other projects we have been exploring are, information boards, which could show footpaths connections, boards that show the local wildlife, flora, and historical sites. It was thought that these boards would connect visually and be positioned strategically as to form a 'treasure hunt' feel.

If anyone has been on the Windrush Path Mosaic Trail, you will know the fresh creative ideas which we could emulate.

# Villagers Voice

If I hadn't have (joined in),
I would not have done so many
lovely things and met
so many wonderful people.

Joy Douglas (remembered by many as Joy Bull) has been a devoted servant to the Brize Norton community for most of her 90 years and has no plans to step back from village life any time soon!

fter spending a couple of hours with Joy, listening to her talk about her life, passions, and achievements, it is hard to imagine meeting anyone more committed to making a difference locally.

A former teacher and governor of the village primary school, youth club leader and parish councillor, Joy also started up a ballroom dance club in the village and was instrumental in getting Elder Bank Hall built.

When I ask how she has managed

to do much, she said: "I like to keep busy."

Joy was born in Shilton in April 1934 but her family soon moved to Grove Farm in Brize Norton. Her dad was a shepherd, and she remembers her and younger sister Daphne helping to look after the lambs.

"It was quite basic," she recalled.
"We kept chicken and hens as
well, and had an oil lamp as there
was no electricity or gas.

"We didn't have much money but had a very happy childhood."

When she was eight or nine they moved to Manor Farm Cottages when her dad got a job as a tractor driver on Mr Wilkins's farm.

Mr Wilkins's daughter was the future Mary Ellis, who went on to become a famous Spitfire pilot, and Joy clearly remembers watching her practising landing her plane in the neighbouring field.

Joy attended Brize Norton School and was then awarded

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a scholarship to go to Burford Grammar School. On leaving school at 16 she worked to earn enough money to go to St Mary's Teacher Training College in Cheltenham when she was 18.

She then taught at Brize Norton School for several years and, after a break to have sons Stephen and Kevin, taught at Clanfield School for 30 years, going on to be deputy head.

"I always knew that's what I wanted to do. I loved teaching and being in a classroom."





Outside work, she ran a youth club in the village for many years, served on Brize Norton church PCC and helped run the Sunday Club, as well as being a member of the WI, the Village Association and the School Association.

She served as a Brize Norton parish councillor for 23 years, including 17 as chairman, but it was her involvement in helping to get Elder Bank Hall built, to replace the old Victory Hut, of which she is most proud.

Joy and her first husband, the late Norman Bull, were actively involved in fundraising for the new hall, and Joy was on the steering committee in charge of the project.

"The village really needed a bigger hall, and everyone was so supportive in making it happen. I am so pleased we were able to do it - it really is the hub of the village."

The other thing that has brought her pride and joy in equal measures has been the ballroom dancing club, which she founded and still helps out each week.

Joy took up dancing as a hobby but it soon became her real passion, and it was through dancing she met Norman, with whom she danced competitively.

She would go on to qualify as a dance teacher and looks back on her time doing this as a source of pride.



"You really can bring so much joy through dancing. It brings so many people together and allows friendships to be made."

Talking of friendships, Joy is equally as proud to have met so many people through the over 60's Club which she has been running for 26 years. Every other week there is something going on from tea and cake, to organ performances, to speakers who talk about their hobbies, passions or work. They also find time to head to the pub every now and again to have a nice meal and chat as well as heading for cream tea to the Humble Bumble!

and 87 women pensioners – one for each of The Queen's 87 years – to be presented with Maundy money in recognition of her contribution to the community.

She described meeting the late monarch as a "wonderful experience".

Joy, who went on to find happiness with her second husband, the late Eric Douglas, celebrated her 90th birthday with a tea dance which she used to enjoy with both Norman and Eric. Surrounded by cards, flowers, balloons and sporting a very warm smile, Joy went on to say how there were 50-60 people there for her birthday at the Village Hall and even included a couple who had dancing lessons in there 35 years ago!



Still as busy as ever, she is absolutely determined to continue to live life to the full.

"I think it's important to make an effort to join in and get involved with things. If I hadn't have done that I would not have done so many lovely things and met so many wonderful people."

## Citizens Advice at 50

As Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire turns 50, we celebrate two outstanding people who have each given 20 years of service to the Charity

itizens Advice West
Oxfordshire (CAWO) first
began to help the people of
West Oxfordshire in 1974 and the
charity is celebrating its 50th
anniversary this year. Two of the
team members have not been
with the charity for quite this
long! but both have worked for
the charity for an incredible 20
years.

Julie Rogers, staff member for over 20 years said:

"Things have changed enormously since I first joined as a volunteer in Sept 2003. CAWO was located opposite the Methodist Church in Witney. With two interview rooms and one office, we all bunked in together. One wall of the office was taken up by advice files. There was no internet then!. Cases were written up on blank templates and stored on paper. I was one of the "new" generation who could word process so I worked out how to format my write ups so that they would print onto the template - get me and my cutting edge technology!

Clients would arrive and wait in the tiny little corridor to be interviewed by a volunteer. Everyone got a full appointment, but some people had to wait all day, or might wait all day and then be asked to return again first thing the next day to be guaranteed an appointment."

"I am enormously proud to be



part of an amazing, professional, compassionate team at CAWO who do so much to help our fellow travelers on this path that we call life, to find a way forward at difficult times. I believe it's essential to look out for each other in and around our communities. As the MP who officially opened the current CAWO office in Witney said, the way a community treats its most vulnerable members is a measure of its worth. On a personal level, I benefit immensely from helping people through my work. Doing good does you good – I highly recommend it."

Mary Williams, volunteer for over 20 years said:

"In 2003 I saw an ad in the Steeple Aston newspaper and I've been volunteering ever since! What changes I've seen. I had semi-retired but decided to volunteer one day a week as my parents always said Citizens Advice was a great organisation. My volunteer roles have varied over the years but what I most enjoyed was always using my brain. My initial training was so comprehensive it took over 6 months!

I also benefited from the Financial Capability training funded by Nationwide. In this advice role, I helped with army redundancies, sessions with young offenders and families in need. I attended court with a disabled client who had to declare she was bankrupt - that was my first time in court.

All advice we delivered faceto-face but since the pandemic when Citizens Advice made rapid changes to our advice support, I've helped with telephone advice and more recently Web chat. "I've learnt a huge amount by volunteering at Citizens Advice. Over many years I've enjoyed the challenges brought by doing a wide variety of different roles which have enabled me to empower our clients to hopefully solve some of their problems."

Teresa Archer, Chief Officer at Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire said:

"We are indebted to Julie (as a staff member) and Mary (as a volunteer) for the 20 years of amazing service they have given. Thank you. Of course we are grateful to all our incredible staff and volunteers for all of their dedicated support over the years, but this marks a special milestone.

We are always looking for new volunteers and with demand for advice as high as it has ever been, joining now is as important as ever. "



#### Life before RAF Brize Norton by Gordon Giles

Before RAF Brize
Norton was an air base
it might be difficult to
imagine that most of
the land that makes
up the Brize base was
very good farm land,
supporting all types
of interesting features
and wild life.

farm track (Bourton Track) ran from the Brize Norton village northern end (close to the present base hangar) meandering through the fields and coming out at Black Bourton by the Mushroom Farm. About halfway along the track stood a large cotswold-type barn (Field Barn) and this housed several pairs of white barn owls (to be seen no more). Nearby where the No 4 Hangar is now was a quarry supplying stone to patch up farm tracks.

Along where the main runway now goes was a long winding hedge called Snake Hedge and this and adjoining fields were home to all forms of wildlife rabbits, hares, pheasants and a covey of partridges. About seven types of birds would take off filling the air all day, including crows, wood pigeons and sky larks. Around September time mushrooms, blackberries, crab apples, rosehips, haws and sloes for wine making could be picked. Foxes lived in the kale patches, all in harmony and left alone.

In the north east corner, by the present fuel dump, was our swimming pool — the Cuckoo





Pen — a big pond fed by the Brize Brook, quite murky but cool! In the summer Brize Brook was filled with minnows, sticklebacks, redbreasts, crayfish and watercress etc.

Further down stream, by the end of the present runway, Farmer Jim and Mrs Hoskins owned a lovely cotswold farm house (Marsh Haddon Farm) approached by a bridge over a stream where large brown trout swam in crystal clear unpolluted water, all now gone under concrete.

Along the south side ran the Great Western Railway from Oxford to Fairford, carrying passengers and freight to villages along the line — AND the train ran on time! On the westem side boundary were the poultry farms, small holdings and market garden nurseries of Carterton, now housing estates. It really was a tranquil and peaceful part of West Oxfordshire.

#### Memories of Brize Norton by Dora Woodley



## In the thirties there were still a few horse drawn vehicles.

The coalman, the milkman, one of the bakers, Benny the rag & bone man from Carterton and a man who sold greengrocery & fish, but of course the one we liked was the horse drawn fish & chip van on a Saturday night. A pennyworth of chips in a paper bag with vinegar. Children used to love vinegar.

Sometimes there was fun and it was on those occasions when we experienced joy of being a small happy community. There were concerts in our village hall, the Hut. We used to have our local comedian who came from Asthall and brought a few other entertainers with him. Whatever, the humour we enjoyed it especially if he spoke in the very old fashioned and extreme form of the local dialect. We would sing, laugh and stamp our feet and get redder and redder.

Then there was a saying going round that there was going to be an aerodrome at Brize Norton. Some people understood but many of us thought it wasn't possible. We were not important enough. They felt it was a mistake and it was Witney aerodrome that was meant.

However, one weekend in our walks we found pegs in the ground marking the extent of the 'drome. After that things happened because of the aerodrome. Electricity was for us as well. Also we had a main water supply for the first time. Standing water pipes were placed outside to cover 3 or 4 houses. Trees were felled and hedges pulled up. Every weekend on our walks to see how things were going we noticed the changes. The spectacle drew in the crowd.

It was a time when there was unemployment in the industrial areas. There was work here and men came from all parts of the UK bringing with them unfamiliar dialects and a kind of presence not familiar to us in our quiet agricultural lifestyle. There always seemed plenty of people walking about the village and of course the pubs were very lively. They worked Saturday mornings and in the afternoon crowds of them walked down the road to catch the 2.30 train. Some went home for the weekend.

Then at last it was finished and there was a celebratory Opening one fine summer afternoon in 1937. All the schools closed down that afternoon. We loved it.

It began as a flying training school. They had planes called Harvards. You had to stop talking when they went over, the noise was colossal. It's a thought that those pilots being trained would have taken part in the Battle of Britain.

#### Hedgehogs in the garden

you may be well aware of them in your gardens, others may have them and be quite unaware of them.

Some gardens may not have hedgehogs because there is no access for them (more on that later).

For many years now hedgehogs have been in decline due to many reasons although the widespread use of slug pellets was a major factor. They now appear to be making a minor comeback (in this area at least) and we should welcome this because they are rather good at dealing with a lot of our garden pests without causing any problems for us.

#### **ABOUT HEDGEHOGS**

Adult hedgehogs will reach over a kilo in weight if there is a good food supply and on average live just over three years. They produce their young (hoglets) usually between June and August and normally produce 4 to 6 young, these will be weaned after around six weeks. In the winter they will usually

hibernate although in our recent mild winters this has been for a shorter period,

The hedgehogs main means of defence is to roll itself up, which presents a predator with a ball completely covered with needle sharp spines (around 6000 of them).

However some predators such as badgers can unroll them and will eat them.

Some dogs can be a problem for hedgehogs, though most cats tend to ignore them

#### WHAT CAN WE DO FOR **HEDGEHOGS?**

Firstly, we can ensure there is access to our gardens. Where they can move freely between gardens they are less likely to need to cross roads. This brings in the concept of hedgehog highways where a group of

houses make access holes in the base of their fences to allow

them

free movement.

We can provide homes for them to overwinter in the form of 'hog houses' these are also sometimes used to raise young. These can be purchased or built if you have DIY skills.

Providing a supplement to their found food is beneficial, using dry kitten food or specialist hedgehog food. Don't be tempted to give them bread and milk, this will give them diarrhoea. Water should also always be available. Bowls should be cleaned thoroughly each day to avoid the

spread of disease.

A feeding station may be required to stop cats gaining access to their food.

Where they are being fed they will become regular visitors and it can be very entertaining to watch their antics.



They will squabble sometimes over food, but they do not seem to be inclined to harm each other I have noticed that the ones that visit my garden have a regular routine and appear at around the same time each evening.

Help our native bugs to thrive, build a bug hotel and maybe WIN a free family ticket to Crocodiles of the World



UK insects are in serious decline. This is bad news for both wildlife and people. Insects pollinate around a third of food crops and most plant life. They form



a basis for a healthy food chain that supports much of our native wildlife, so without our hard-working bugs, we risk the breakdown of our natural world. Ideas for 'rooms' of your bug hotel include rotting wood and sticks, hollow bamboo canes, pinecones, and smooth flat rocks.

note was sent to pupils by Robyn Jones, Headteacher, Brize Norton Primary School which had been brought to their attention by an Oxfordshire Head:

'I wanted to give you all a head's up about an online message group I was made aware of yesterday by some of my year 6 pupils. It is a very concerning WhatsApp group where some of my pupils have been added by friends without their permission. The aim of the group is apparently to try and become the biggest WhatsApp group in the UK and I believe at one point it was called 'Everybody in the UK' but the pupils tell me the group name changes. At one point it may have been called 'Ronaldo'

My pupils have mentioned pupils from (other Oxfordshire schools) are also inviting friends into the group. I sent a letter to my parents yesterday and one parent got back to me to say they have discovered that their child was in the group and has now removed herself but described the group as 'toxic'. Approximate numbers of people in the group vary between the children I have spoken to, ranging from 70 to 500.'



#### West Oxfordshire Local Plan 2041

n the August – October 2023 edition of the Brize Breeze Magazine, we wrote about WODC updating their 2031 Local Plan to extend it to 2041. One of the functions of a Local Plan is to set out how development, including housing, business construction, and infrastructure can best benefit the area that they are responsible for

In this article, we illustrated on a map, the four areas that landowners had put forward for consideration for future development in Brize Norton.

#### These were:

Land at Kilkenny Farm, Brize
Norton (highlighted in purple)
Land north of Monahan Way,
Brize Norton (highlighted in red)
Land north east of Brize Norton
(highlighted in green)
Land east of Manor Road
(highlighted in yellow)

We have now had the opportunity to take the Planning Policy Manager around these sites so he could see first-hand, the influence any one of them would have on our Landscape Character and Key Views. At this meeting it was discussed that the WODC Consultation Document had omitted one very large area of land which had been put forward by the landowner! This is all the land to the east of the

village from Witney Road down to the RAF Brize Norton runway approach lights and eastwards to the Parish Boundary.

We have highlighted this area in green because it is represented by the same land agent as the land to the north east of the Parish.

The Parish Council has received a presentation from each of the land agents (except land to the east of Manor Road) to show us their vision for their respective areas. We made it very clear to them that this was a presentation only and not a consultation. We advised them that if they wished to consult on their proposals, for transparency, it must be held in the Elder Bank Hall with members of our Community present.

We now await to hear from WODC as to how many houses and how much business construction will be required in the Carterton sub-area and in particular, in the Parish of Brize Norton. The new Labour Government could also have an influence on these numbers as they develop their own policy on housing numbers.

Please remember, all these proposals are speculative at the moment, but we will keep you informed of any updates regarding these land areas as and when we are made aware of any change in their status.

#### **IMPROVEMENTS FOR QUICKER AND MORE EFFICIENT RESPONSE**

xfordshire's FixMyStreet app, which allows residents to report potholes, faulty street lights and a host of other street defects and queries, has been updated.

The number of categories has been streamlined but they have now been split up into subcategories to make it easier for people to find the section they are looking for.

In some cases, more information and illustrations have been

provided to help users choose the most appropriate category.

The changes are aimed at reducing the number of reports sent to the wrong department or council, which can delay the problem being resolved.

The updated version also includes an aerial map of the county, as well as a regular map, to help people pinpoint the location of the problem.

The changes will be monitored over the next few months to see what impact they have, and the views of users will be sought.

More than 1,000 reports are regularly made to Fix My Street every week, with users encouraged to include photographs of the defect to help the inspectors.


